<Purpose>

This workshop is conducted as part of Ministry of Health, Labour and Welfare's Research Grant (MHLW) funded research which aims to develop an effective global health diplomacy educational program. There is an urgent need to cultivate human resources who can advocate for global health at the global level in harmony with international and national interests at governance meetings such as the World Health Assembly. This workshop was designed and will be implemented to help achieve such goals.

<Target audience>

The workshop is open to young and mid-level public and private sector practitioners who are planning to participate in a governing body meeting of international organizations and have little experience in such international meetings. Possible affiliations include MHLW, MOFA, JICA, JIHS, universities, think tanks, NGOs.

CV/Profile	<p>In the past ten years, Dr. Hiroki Nakatani has held academic positions in Japan as Visiting Professor of Keio University and Invited Professor at Osaka University Post Graduate School of Medicine. He is the former Chair of the Executive Board of WHO (2019-2020) and Chair of Committee A of the 75th World Health Assembly in 2022. Currently, Dr. Nakatani also serves in various national and international organizations as Adviser (International Affairs) to the Minister of Health, Labour and Welfare; Chair, Board of Directors, Global Health Innovative Technology Fund (GHIT Fund); and Director, Human Resource Strategy Center for Global Health at the Japan Institute for Health Security. He is a veteran public health specialist with over 45 years of experience, who started his career at the Ministry of Health, Labour and Welfare in Japan. He worked extensively in health policy, public health, international health, and health science and technology. His national career includes serving as Director-General of Health and Welfare Services in Hiroshima Prefecture, where he was in charge of integrating health and welfare services in preparation for the arrival of a rapidly ageing society. Regarding his international career, he served the WHO Headquarters twice. From March 2007 to May 2015, he served as Assistant Director-General of WHO, leading the largest technical cluster of HIV/AIDS, Tuberculosis, Malaria and Neglected Tropical Diseases. Dr. Nakatani received his M.D. from Keio University School of Medicine, MHPed from the University of New South Wales, and a Ph.D. from Keio University.</p>
Lecture summary	<p>The first session, "WHO and its role in global health governance, " aims to achieve the following objectives : (1) to understand evolution, definition and frameworks of global health, (2) to understand the complex architecture of global health with special attention to UN agencies' roles, particularly WHO; (3) to understand the governance and operation style of WHO; (4) to gain practical skills to be an influential contributor in governing body meetings. This starts by digesting the massive volume of background paper in a relatively short time. Participants are invited to visit the WHO governing bodies' website (Ref.2) before coming to class. This experience will make participants miserable initially, but after the session, everyone will feel encouraged.</p> <p>The following Mock-up sessions aim to be an effective contributor in the official meetings. The four-step approach will be practiced: (1) Reviewing the background paper; (2) Digesting the instructions given by the Government after inter-ministerial discussion; (3) Drafting the intervention and making the actual intervention to fellow participants. At each step, there are seasoned hints and skills. Mock exercises enable participants to improve each one's interventions through practice and constructive comments from facilitators and fellow participants.</p>

CV/Profile	<p>Saki NAKAMURA, MD, is a board-certified pediatrician working as a medical technical officer in the Government of Japan. She spent more than three years in the International Affairs Division in the Ministry of Health, Labour and Welfare, where she has negotiated the amendments to the International Health Regulations (IHR) 2005 and the pandemic instrument towards their adoption at the 77th World Health Assembly. She has also worked with Colombia, the Democratic Republic of Congo, WHO, UNICEF and CEPI in the recent mpox response. Currently, she is working on national policy development in the field of maternal and child health, which involves policy research planning, child health checkups, child death reviews and human milk banks. She received her BSc from McGill University and MD from Hamamatsu University School of Medicine.</p>
Lecture summary	<p>My lecture aims to prepare participants for the WHO's governing body meetings where they are expected to form a national position and make effective interventions.</p>

CV/profile	<p>Haruka SAKAMOTO, MD MPH, PhD, is a primary care physician and visiting associate professor at the St Luke's International University. She got her M.D from Sapporo Medical University and worked as a physician at St Luke's International Hospital in Tokyo for several years. She then got a scholarship from the World Bank and got her MPH at the Harvard T.H Chan School of Public Health. From 2011-2013 and 2016, she worked at the international cooperation department, Ministry of Health, Labour and Welfare of Japan, where she was deeply involved in health policy activities in Japan. As part of the work, she participated in WHO meetings, G7 meetings, and bilateral cooperation activities through JICA (Japan International Cooperation Agency). She got PhD from University of Tokyo in 2021, and she's also currently working at World Health Organization Western Pacific Regional Office as a consultant, senior manager at Health and Global Policy Institute, senior fellow at Tokyo Foundation for Policy Research, and Associate Member of the Science Council of Japan (26th). Her current research focuses on health system strengthening, health care financing, and politics in global health.</p>
Lecture summary	<p>Many people are unfamiliar with an intervention at international conferences and have no idea what is the "format" of an intervention. In this lecture, I will show you what to include in your intervention, starting with the format of interventions you should make at international conferences (mainly at the WHO meetings). On the other hand, I will tell you about some bad things you better not to say (don't).</p>



Timothy ARMSTRONG

CV/profile	<p>Dr Timothy Armstrong is a global health diplomacy and noncommunicable disease (NCD) expert from New South Wales, Australia, with more than 30 years of experience. Following four years working in Australia for a range of health policy-focused organizations, Dr Armstrong joined WHO in 2002, with an emphasis on NCDs.</p> <p>In his 23 years with WHO, he has served in its Geneva-based headquarters as a Technical Officer (NCDs), Program Coordinator (Chronic Diseases and Health Promotion), Unit Head (Global Strategy for Diet, Physical Activity and Health), Head of Secretariat to the WHO High Level Commission on the Prevention of Childhood Obesity, and most recently, from 2015, as Director of the Department of Governing Bodies. In this latter role, he was responsible for WHO's World Health Assembly and Executive Board, overseeing strategic engagement with WHO's 194 Member States at the highest levels, in addition to managing other high-level WHO governance mechanisms and structures. In 2024 Dr Armstrong was appointed as the WHO Representative to the Lao People's Democratic Republic.</p> <p>Across his global health diplomacy work, Dr Armstrong has guided core governance and diplomatic interfaces to strategically shape the global health agenda. He has focused on ensuring that low- and middle-income countries have a voice in global health decision-making, and supported countries to achieve consensus on technical and political issues in an increasingly complex geopolitical environment. Over the past two decades he has worked with increasing urgency to address the acceleration of climate change and environmental degradation as the greatest threats to human health.</p> <p>In the field of NCDs, Dr Armstrong has been responsible for implementing NCD risk factor research in more than 50 countries, as well as supporting childhood obesity prevention and physical activity strategies across all WHO regions. Throughout his career Dr Armstrong's priority has remained supporting Member States. With deployments to more than 80 countries (including within Asia), he has focused on supporting the development and implementation of practical, achievable and impact-focused strategies, policies and programmes. This has cemented his belief in WHO's mission, and the effectiveness that WHO technical support can deliver when well aligned with national priorities.</p>

Dr Armstrong has peer-reviewed numerous publications covering genetic epidemiology, disease surveillance, health diplomacy and global health governance. He holds a PhD in Genetic Epidemiology and a Bachelor of Science with 1st Class Honours (Population Behaviour, Genetics and Social Epidemiology) from the University of New England, Australia.

Lecture summary

World Health Organization (WHO) resolutions are crucial for setting international health priorities, guiding policies, and fostering global cooperation to improve public health outcomes. Drafting these Resolutions involves a structured process that includes the identification of health issues, informal and formal consultation with member states and stakeholders, drafting the proposal, reviewing and revising the draft through discussions and negotiations, and finally adopting the resolution during meetings of the WHO Governing Bodies. This process ensures that resolutions are comprehensive and are usually consensus-driven.

This lecture will examine the process of drafting a Resolution and the roles of Member States and the secretariat and others in the drafting process. It will examine the role of the Chair and rapporteur of formal and informal drafting groups.

Examples of difficult negotiations, some of which did not reach consensus, will be used to illustrate the refinement of a draft Resolution.

CV/profile	<p>Dr. Satoshi “TOSHI” Ezoe currently serves as the Deputy Assistant Minister for Global Health at the Ministry of Health, Labour and Welfare of Japan (MHLW) since April 2025. Dr Ezoe is a health diplomat and a medical officer promoting public health nationally and globally. He joined MHLW in 2002 after clinical training. He has since then engaged in health care and public health policy, including in the areas of global health, universal health insurance system, non-communicable diseases, including mental health and cancer control, and infectious diseases crisis management. He was seconded to UNAIDS Headquarters in Geneva (2009-2012). He was the first appointed Senior Coordinator for Global Health at MHLW (2015- 2017). He was a Counsellor of the Permanent Mission of Japan to the United Nations (2017-2020), where he was instrumental in facilitating UN General Assembly High-Level Meetings on tuberculosis (2018) and universal health coverage (2019). In August 2020, amid the COVID-19 crisis, he became the Director of the Global Health Policy Division at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, where he was responsible for coordinating overall global health strategy and diplomacy, including COVID-19 response, health agendas for the G7 Hiroshima Summit in 2023, and contribution to global health institutions and Initiatives such as the WHO, UNFPA, the Global Fund, Gavi, UNITAID and UHC2030. He was the corresponding author for two prime ministers and a foreign minister who contributed vision articles in the Lancet on global health. He is a Medical Doctor with a PhD and received a dual Master of Public Health and Public Administration from Harvard University.</p>

Lecture summary	<p>The Preamble of the Japanese Constitution (1946) states: “... We (the Japanese people) desire to occupy an honored place in an international society designed and dedicated to the preservation of peace, and the banishment of tyranny and slavery, oppression and intolerance, for all time from the earth. ...” Well, then, what can you do in practice to occupy such a place in the international community? By what means and how?</p> <p>It is indeed important to voice what your concerns and what you want, and even more so to share a vision and build an alliance. But what if your vision is not shared with other actors, or not even within your own country? Are you ready to pursue fighting in isolation? Or, are you giving up? Is there a way in between ? Good preparation at home, in advance of a negotiation, is a key to a successful outcome.</p>
